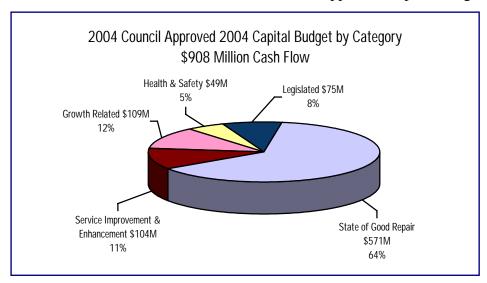

City Council Approves a \$907.932 Million 2004 Tax Supported Capital Budget

Toronto City Council has approved a 2004 tax supported capital budget with a new cash flow funding of: \$907.932 million in 2004, requiring future year cash flow funding commitments of \$897.765 million in 2005; \$263.010 million in 2006; \$90.852 million in 2007; \$16.112 million in 2008 and \$9.545 million in 2009 and beyond, for a total cost of \$2,185.216 million during the period 2004 to 2013. Including 2003 project funding of \$253.817 million carried forward into 2004, the 2004 capital budget is \$1,161.749 million.

The pie chart below shows the distribution of the 2004 Council approved Capital Budget by category.

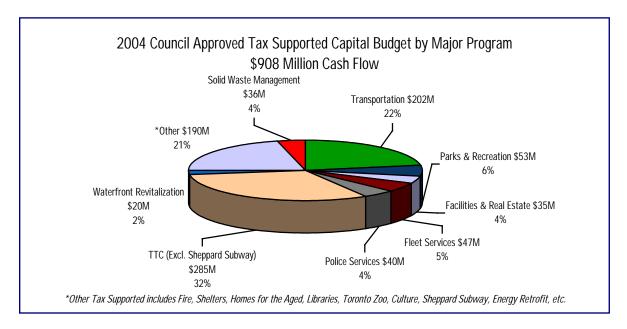


Debt financing for the 2004 capital budget totals \$320.998 million. Other significant financing sources include Reserves/Reserve Funds of \$132.095 million, Capital from Current of \$124.172 million, and Development Charges of \$23.954 million.

The cash flow for the 2004 Toronto Transit Commission (TTC) gross Capital Budget and Plan, as tabled to Council was \$338.134 million with total commitments of \$813.351 million. This assumed that the Provincial and Federal governments would contribute one-third each toward financing the TTC capital projects. However, the TTC 2004 Capital Budget will result in a significant debt financing increase for the City based on recent Federal and Provincial funding announcements. The 2004 TTC capital budget was adjusted to reflect the Provincial / Federal Five Year Plan commitment of a maximum of \$285 million for 2004.

The chart that follows illustrates the 2004 Council Approved Tax Supported Capital Budget of \$908 million, by major program area. As indicated in this chart, TTC accounts for \$285 million or 32 percent of the total tax supported program. All other city Departments, Agencies, Boards and Commissions combined represents \$623 million or 68 percent of the total.



Excluding debt service charges, the 2004 tax-supported Capital Budget has an estimated incremental operating budget impact of \$2.306 million in 2004 with increased operating costs of: \$5.888 million in 2005; \$0.769 million in 2006; \$2.461 million in 2007; \$1.822 million in 2008 and \$6.953 million in 2009 and beyond resulting from the approval of the 2004 Capital Budget.

Cash flow for the 2004 – 2008 rate-supported Parking Authority capital plan totals \$22.744 million, requiring future year cash flow funding commitments of \$0.650 million in 2005 for a total cost of \$23.394 million. Including 2003 projects carried forward into 2004 with \$11.180 million cash flow, the 2004 capital budget is \$33.924 million. The Parking Authority capital budget is entirely financed from parking fees.

- \$1.788 M for the Toronto Remedial Action Plan for ongoing monitoring and rebuilding of watershed habitats and covering such sites as the Don and Humber rivers
- \$0.300 M for Black Creek Pioneer Village retrofit

TORONTO TRANSIT COMMISSION:

\$285.0 M Gross, **\$114** M net excluding the Sheppard Subway project [2003 Gross Budget - \$311.6 M gross, \$84.5 M net excluding Sheppard Subway.]

- \$47.4 M for track replacement, including \$11.8 M for subway tracks and \$35.6 M for surface tracks
- \$36.6 M for signal, electrical and communication maintenance and upgrades; this includes \$16.8 M for signals, \$5.2 M for communications, \$7.1 M for traction power, and \$7.5 M for power distribution.
- **\$62.6** M for building and structure refurbishment and structure rehabilitation, including \$20.9 M for bridges and tunnels and the balance for yards, road and other repairs; this also includes an unspecified budget reduction
- \$99.6 M for the purchase of new vehicles and the rebuilding of existing vehicles, including \$61.8 M for the purchase of 120 new buses, \$16.4 M for the rebuilding of 101 existing buses, \$9.5 M for subway car overhauls, \$4.9 M for new non-transit vehicles and \$7 M for small overhaul projects
- \$25.6 M for computer and other equipment, including \$17.3 M for intelligent transportation and signal systems, \$8.3 M for the replacement of corporate computer systems, and the balance for other such equipment
- \$13.2 M for a variety of smaller capital projects
- \$140 M in Provincial and Federal combined funding over each of the next five years. On March 30, 2004 a tripartite agreement between the City, the Province and the Federal Government to cost share \$1.1 billion over the next five years was announced for the TTC's capital program. The agreement is intended to provide predictability to a minimum level of capital subsidy over the period (\$70 M annually from the Province and Federal Government, respectively)
 - The 2004 TTC Recommended Capital Budget assumes \$70 M from the Province, \$70 M from the Federal Government and \$145 M from the City

- Negotiations are on-going with the senior levels of government on the eligibility criteria of this funding so that the immediate requirements for state of good repair projects can be more fully included to maximize as much of the cash flow requirements as possible in 2004 and 2005
- In the event that annual cash flows from the Province and the Federal Government fall below the \$140 M assumed, then TTC capital projects may need to be deferred and/or the City may have to assume additional debt

- \$1.147 M in 2004 and a 2005 commitment of \$1.105 M for the North Site Redevelopment Detailed Design over two years to complete the design phase to relocate the Canadian Domain and re-align biozones on the site
- \$0.217 M in 2004 and a 2005 commitment of \$1.470 M for a new animal Quarantine Facility
- \$1.309 M in 2004 and a 2005 commitment of \$0.416M for Information Systems improvement including a new ERP system, upgraded animal records database and replacement of hardware
- \$1.332 M in 2004 and a 2005 commitment of \$0.453 M for building & services refurbishments including completion of fire alarm upgrades, upgrade other electrical service infrastructure, and replacement of the emergency generator system
- \$0.782 M for other infrastructure refurbishment projects and to make improvements to grounds and visitor service areas
