conservancy. Webster's Dictionary says a conservancy is "a careful preservation and protection of something; especially....of a natural resource to prevent exploitation, destruction, or neglect."

What do we want a parks conservancy to foster?



Using what we have: best use of existing buildings, talents of staff, talents of community. Thrifty: fewer levels of bureaucracy, better repair and maintenance, open budget information. Simpler structure: easier access, local connection between community and city staff, working together. Ingenuity: taking the best advice from other conservancies elsewhere in Canada and

abroad, and adding it to the best local practices: the "Toronto model." Keeping our tax-funded parks PUBLIC.
