### CAN ONTARIO REFUSE?

NEW RACING CLUBS MUST GET PROVINCIAL LICENSE.

Attorney-General Intimates That There Are Occasions When This Might be Refused-A Serious Proceeding to Interfere.

"The Dominion authorities unquestionably have the technical legal right to grant the charter," said Hon. J. J. Foy the Attorney-General, when interviewed by The Globe concerning the question as to the right of the Ontarlo Government to refuse to issue a Provincial license to the Metropolitan Racing Association, whose Onturio charter the Attorney-General cancelled, and who have since obtained a Federal charter from the

Dominion authorities. "The Ontario Government has always adopted the policy that when the Dominion grants a charter for which it has the legal right, the Province issues the license on application. To refuse the license would be an ungracious act, and one of great seriousness, as it would precipi. tate a direct clash of authority. 
