2008 BUDGET BRIEFING NOTE Increase and Expand Waterfront and Regional Parking Fees

To achieve the 2008 Operating Budget target, it is recommended that paid parking be extended to regional parks and that the rate be increased from \$5 to \$10 per day, for additional net revenue of \$0.300 million annually.

Issue/Background

- 1. Current Waterfront Parking Information:
 - During the 2007 Operating Budget process, paid parking at 10 waterfront lots was approved at the following Park locations:
 - > Woodbine Beach
 - ➤ Ashbridges Bay
 - Lakeshore / Windermere
 - Lakeshore / Ellis
 - Lakeshore / Parkside
 - ➤ Lakeshore / Dowling
 - ➤ Bluffers
 - Humber Bay East
 - ➤ Humber Bay West
 - Coronation Park
 - Parking charges are \$5 per day.
 - Paid parking is only charged on the weekends and statutory holidays from Victoria Day (end of May) to Labour Day (beginning of September).
 - The Toronto Parking Authority installs and maintains the ticket machines, collects revenues and maintains the parking spaces. They recover operating costs of approximately \$25 per space per year and 25% of all revenue collected. It should also be noted that once a municipal parking lot charges for use of space, it is deemed eligible for property taxes, which are paid out of the revenues collected at the location by the TPA.

The 2007 budgeted revenue from the 10 Waterfront Park locations is \$0.297 million. Actual 2007 revenue to Parks, Forestry & Recreation, net of TPA fees and property taxes, is \$0.256 million.

2. 2008 Operating Budget Recommendation:

- It is recommended that the current \$5 per day parking charge be increased to \$10 per day and the season be expanded to Thanksgiving, for an annual net revenue budget increase of approximately \$0.075 million.
- It is also recommended that paid parking be expanded to the following 6 regional parks:
 - ➤ High Park
 - **Edwards Gardens**
 - Sunnybrook Park
 - James Gardens
 - ➤ Marie Curtis Park
 - G. Ross Lord Park
- These locations are considered regional parks, as they are larger than neighborhood parks, have multiple amenities, larger parking lots and attract many users.
- Based on estimates provided by the Toronto Parking Authority, a \$10 per day parking fee at these locations on weekends and statutory holidays during June, July, August and September would provide additional net revenue to P F & R of \$0.225 million annually.
- These 6 regional parks are large green spaces that accommodate park users for leisure, picnicking, sport activities and special events. Many of these activities are subject to a permit fee which the user pays for to play baseball, have a picnic or organize a fundraiser. A parking fee would be an additional cost to the users who wish to drive to these locations and may impact participation.
