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PART I: CAPITAL PROGRAM

Executive Summary

- Parks, Forestry and Recreation's 2008 Approved Capital Budget of \$110.268 million was 20.2% spent as at June 30, 2007. As a result of impediments such as changes in plans relating to other parties and prolonged public consultations, actual expenditures by year-end are anticipated to be \$82.765 million or 75.1% of the 2008 Approved Capital Budget. Of this unspent balance, \$27.503 million is currently projected to be carried forward into 2009.
- The 10-Year Recommended Capital Plan and Forecast for Parks, Forestry and Recreation was developed with a focus on maintaining the health & safety and state-of-good repair needs of existing assets, while providing limited new initiatives in accordance with the strategic directions and principles approved by City Council, including, *Our Common Grounds*, the *Recreation Facilities Report*, and various City-wide strategies such as the Climate Change Action Plan.
- The 2009 Recommended Capital Budget; 2010 to 2013 Recommended Capital Plan; and 2014 to 2018 Proposed Capital Forecast totals \$748.333 million and requires debt funding of \$507.664 million. Of this total, cash flow of \$390.263 million with debt funding of \$232.539 million is recommended for the Parks, Forestry & Recreation 5-Year Capital Plan, with new cash flows of \$82.799 million in 2009; \$102.686 million in 2010; \$89.409 million in 2011; \$55.007 million in \$2012; and \$60.362 million in 2013.
- The 2009–2013 Recommended Capital Plan calls for total debt of \$232.539 million, meeting the debt affordability target. The 2014-2018 Proposed Capital Forecast meets the 5 year debt target of \$275.125 but exceeds the 2014 target of \$51.978 million by \$3.022 million or 2.5% and is under target in each of the years 2015-2018 by smaller amounts.
- Debt financing is predominantly allocated to Legislated and State-of-Good-Repair projects within the Parks Forestry and Recreation 2009-2013 Capital Plan and 2014-2018 Proposed Capital Forecast 75% in the 2009-2013 years and 76.6% in the 2014-2018 years. In contrast, Service Improvement projects are assigned 11.2% of debt financing in 2009-2013 and 15.8% in 2014-2018 and Growth projects are assigned 11.2% of debt financing in 2009-2013 and 6.1% in 2014-2018. This demonstrates the importance of other sources, including Development Changes and Reserve Funds to provide financing for Service Improvement and Growth projects.
- The Parks, Forestry and Recreation Recommended 2009-2013 Capital Plan, excluding unspent 2008 funding to be carried forward into 2008, totals \$390.263 million, of which 48% (\$186.875 million) is allocated to State-of-Good-Repair projects, 31% (\$120.494 million) to Growth related projects, 19% (\$75.539 million) to Service Improvement projects and 2% (\$7.055 million) to Legislated requirements.
- Based on those assets that have been audited to date, Parks, Forestry and Recreation will
 accumulate, by the end of 2008, a state-of-good-repair backlog of approximately \$232.831
 million. Even with the adoption of the 2009 Recommended Capital Budget, this backlog is

projected to grow to \$260.928 million by the end of 2009. It should be noted that the debt target was increased for 2009 to \$40.681 million from the 2008 level of \$35.130 million to provide additional funding for this purpose. In fact, even with \$186.875 million of state-of-good—repair funding over the period 2009 to 2013, the backlog will grow to \$330.625 at the end of 2013. The forecasted backlog at the end of 2018 is projected to be \$365.870 million.

- The Parks, Forestry and Recreation Recommended 5-Year Capital Plan will increase the Program's future-year operating budgets by approximately \$12.338 million net over the five-year period. Approximately half of this impact arises from capital projects approved in 2008 and prior years. In addition, the parks to be developed through Waterfront Toronto, City Planning and Toronto and Region Conservation Authority initiatives will result in additional operating impacts to the Parks, Forestry and Recreation Program.
- The primary issues surrounding the Parks, Forestry and Recreation Recommended 10-Year Capital Plan and Forecast are: a) the ongoing pressure on future capital and operating budgets resulting from new and improved facilities; b) the state-of-good-repair backlog that continues to grow; and c) the development of a comprehensive strategy, driven by the Program's Service Plan, to prioritize the Program's future Capital Plans in the most effective manner.
- The Recommended 5-Year Capital Plan for Parks, Forestry and Recreation will deliver:
 - o Community Centre facility projects Edithvale, Warden Woods, and York, Railway Lands, and Regent Park;
 - o Pool Replacement for Lord Dufferin Pool in the Regent Park area;
 - o Safety Re-fits on the Toronto Island Ferries Sam McBride and Thomas Rennie to meet Transport Canada new requirements;
 - o Security system improvements for various facilities; and
 - o Fleet and Equipment to support expansion and maintenance of the Tree Canopy.
- The Parks, Forestry and Recreation Recommended 5-Year Capital Plan is aligned with a range of strategic priorities outlined in the Mayor's Mandate, including *Strengthen Our At-Risk Neighbourhoods*, *Make Progress on The Waterfront*, and *Make Toronto a Clean and Beautiful City*.
- Bike Plan projects, totalling \$16.060 million, including all financing, previously included in the Parks, Forestry and Recreation Capital Budget are now included in the Transportation Services 2009-2013 Recommended Capital Plan and 2014-2018 Proposed Capital Forecast to facilitate delivery of the Bike Plan by 2012.
- Priority Neighborhood Projects to be delivered by Parks Forestry and Recreation in 2009 and 2010 totalling \$16.514 million with debt funding of \$5.725, are included in the Recommended 5-Year Capital Plan.
- The 2009 Recommended Capital Budget meets the 2009 debt affordability guideline of \$40.681 million. Of the total 2009 cash flow of \$82,799 million, 34% or \$24.247 million is

Recommendations

The City Manager and Acting Chief Financial Officer recommend that:

- 1. Council approve the 2009 Recommended Capital Budget for Parks, Forestry and Recreation with a total project cost of \$94.147 million, and 2009 cash flow of \$ 106.129 million and future year commitments of \$ 50.494 million comprised of the following:
 - a) New Cash Flow funding for:
 - i.) 99 new and change of scope sub-projects with a 2009 total project cost of \$94.147 million that requires cash flow of \$54.102 million in 2009 and future year commitments of \$23.425 million in 2010 and \$16.620 million in 2011;
 - ii.) 11 previously approved sub-projects with a 2009 cash flow of \$21.406 million and a future year commitment of \$10.449 in 2010;
 - iii.) 24 previously approved sub-projects with carry forward funding from 2007 and prior years requiring 2009 cash flow of \$7.291 million which forms part of the affordability target that requires Council to reaffirm its commitment; and
 - b) 2008 approved cash flow for 43 previously approved sub-projects with carry forward funding from 2008 into 2009 totalling \$23.330 million;
- 2. Council approve the new debt costs of \$1.017 million in 2009 and incremental costs of \$4.609 million in 2010, \$1.555 million in 2011, and \$0.570 million in 2012, resulting from the approval of the 2009 Recommended Capital Budget, to be included in the 2009 and future year operating impacts;
- 3. Council consider the net operating impacts in Parks, Forestry and Recreation's Operating Budget of \$3.834 million in 2009, \$1.656 million in 2010, and \$1.036 million in 2011, emanating from the approval of the 2009 Recommended Capital Budget, within the overall scope of Parks Forestry and Recreation's 2009, 2010 and 2011 operating budget submissions;
- 4. Council approve the 2010-2013 Capital Plan for Parks, Forestry and Recreation totalling \$256.970 million in project estimates, comprised of \$68.812 million in 2010, \$72.789 million in 2011, \$55.007 million in 2012, and \$60.362 million in 2013;
- 5. Council approve in principle the 2014-2018 Proposed Capital Forecast for Parks, Forestry and Recreation totalling \$748.833 million in project estimates, comprised of \$58.357 million in 2014, \$74.828 million in 2015, \$83.262 million in 2016, \$81.217 million in 2017, and \$60.406 million in 2018, and that this forecast be used as a foundation for preparing a firm 2010-2019 Capital Plan and Forecast as part of the 2010 Capital Budget process;
- 6. the Capital Emergency Fund sub-project be approved with funding of \$0.500 million for 2009 with the following conditions:

- a) projects funded must be demonstrable emergencies presenting a safety or security hazard, or impacting current operations, with a potential for significant damage resulting from the continuation of the problem identified;
- b) all projects charged to the 2009 Capital Emergency Fund sub-project must be reported to Finance staff to ensure structures are provided to ensure accountability;
- c) use of the funding must be reported in all variance reports and to Budget Committee at the time of consideration of the 2010 Capital Budget; and
- d) any unspent balance at year-end cannot be carried forward;
- 7. all sub-projects with third-party financing be approved conditionally, subject to the receipt of such funding during 2009 and, if such financing is not forthcoming, their priority and funding be reassessed by City Council relative to other City-financed priorities and needs;
- 8. approval of capital projects for Fleet acquisition be conditional upon the approval of the associated service expansions in the 2009 Operating Budget;
- 9. to comply with Capital Policy, the costs of future land acquisitions be included in future parkland and facility development projects according to established service priorities; and
- 10. a strategy to create a future financial provision for renewal and replacement of the Toronto Island ferry fleet be included for consideration during the 2010 Operating Budget process.


Parks, Forestry and Recreation spent \$22.227 million or 20.2% of the 2008 Approved Capital Budget of \$110.268 million by the end of the 2nd Quarter of 2008. The spending rate is expected to improve by year end, reaching \$82.765 million or 75.1% of the 2008 Approved Capital Budget.

Projected under-spending at year end of \$7.9 million arises from delays with Community Centre projects, with delays in the Warden Corridor Centre, in particular, due to a change in plans for the project.


In the Parks Development project, projected under-spending of \$5.9 million arises from delays with the CP PS LEAD right-of-way development and Wychwood Park, projects that will not be completed by year-end. Three Grange Park projects will also be delayed, as community consultation is taking longer than anticipated.

The Arena Capital Asset Maintenance project will be delayed due to additional community consultations and the Colonel Sam Smith Skating Trail project will also not be completed this year due to an extended community consultation process.

10-Year Capital Plan and Forecast Overview

- The 2009 Recommended Capital Budget, 2010-2013 Recommended Capital Plan and 2014-2018 Proposed Capital Forecast for Parks, Forestry and Recreation focuses on maintaining the health & safety and state of good repair of existing assets, while providing for limited new initiatives and improvements. Wherever possible, the Program has leveraged partnership funding to support its program. Our Common Grounds and the Recreation Facilities Report have provided strategic guidance to the 10-Year Plan and Forecast.
- Parks, Forestry and Recreation's 10 Year Capital Plan and Forecast includes ongoing State-of-Good-Repair work for \$409.056 million or 55% of the total, as well as several high priority new projects in the 2009-2013 years, including the development of a new Community Centre and Main Park in the Regent Park redevelopment area, and new community centre facilities, Edithvale, York and Warden. The planning phase of a new community facility in the Railway Lands (Spadina/Front) will be initiated in 2009. In the Forecast years, additional new Community Centre projects are included Western North York, North East Scarborough, and Wabash Parkdale.
- The Parks Forestry and Recreation 2009-2013 Recommended Capital Plan meets the debt affordability targets year to year totalling \$232.539 million. The 2014-2018 Proposed Capital Forecast meets the 2014-2018 debt target of \$275.125 million for the 5 year period, but is over target by \$3.022 million or 5.5% in 2014, and under target in each of the years from 2015-2018, by small amounts each year.
- Reflective of its guiding objectives, the 10 Year Capital Plan and Forecast allocates 55% of the total forecasted cash flow to State of Good Repair projects at \$423.185, 24% to Growth Related projects at \$182.013 million, 20% to Service Improvement projects at \$150.209 million, and 1% to Legislated projects at \$7.055 million.

• Multi-Year Debt Affordability Targets

- The Parks Forestry and Recreation 2009 Recommended Capital Budget, 2010-2013 Recommended Capital Plan, and the 2014-2018 Proposed Capital Forecast meets the 10 year debt affordability targets over the 10 year period. However, in the 2014-2018 Capital Forecast, 2014 is over the target by \$3.022 million or 5.5%, while debt is just under target in the last 4 years to compensate. This issue will be reviewed when the 2010-2019 Plan and Forecast is prepared.
- It must be noted that the debt targets for the 2009-2012 period were each increased by approximately \$4 million per year over the levels provided in 2008, to provide additional funding to reduce the SOGR backlog.

Project Financing

• The Recommended 5-Year Capital Plan, excluding projects carried forward from 2008 requires funding of \$390.263 million. This financing is composed of debt funding at the corporate target of \$232.539 million or 60%, funding from Reserve Funds of \$76.794 million or 20%, funding from Development Charges of \$32.959 million or 8% and other sources (including donations) of \$47.971 million or 12%.

• The 2014-2018 Proposed Capital Forecast requires financing of \$358.070 million, comprised of debt funding at the corporate target of \$275.125 million or 77%, funding from Reserve Funds of \$24.649 million or 7%, funding from Development Charges of \$58.296 million or 16%. Additional funding from donations and other sources is likely, but is usually becomes available only 2-3 years in advance of delivery.

Development Charge Funded Projects

- The Parks Forestry and Recreation 2009 Recommended Capital Budget and 2010-2013
 Recommended Capital Plan includes \$32.959 million of Development Charge funding representing 8.4% of total financing.
 - ➤ Development Charge funding in the 2009 Recommended Capital Budget of \$5.993 million reflects funds already received by the City.
 - ➤ Development Charge funding for 2010-2013 is estimated on the basis of the new Development Charge By-Law, which will be before Council for consideration shortly. These estimates will require review during the 2010 Capital Budget process to ensure consistency with the new Development Charge Bylaw adopted by Council.
- The Parks Forestry and Recreation 2014-2018 Proposed Capital Forecast includes \$58.296 million
 of Development Charge funding representing 16.3% of total financing. As the 2014-2018 Forecast
 will be reviewed during the 2010 Capital Budget process, this forecasted funding will be reviewed
 and revised, as necessary.

State of Good Repair (SOGR) and Unmet Service Needs

- Funding State-of-Good-Repair projects is a priority in the 2009-2013 Recommended Capital Plan. For the 5-years, SOGR funding represents \$186.875 million, or 48% of the Capital Plan. In fact, an increased debt target of approximately \$4 million per year in 2009-2012 and \$14 million in 2013 was provided to address the SOGR backlog.
- SOGR audits of assets are undertaken on a 3- to 5-year cyclical basis. Parks, Forestry and Recreation's state-of-good-repair work is identified in the Budget and Plan as its Capital Asset Management Plan (CAMP). The results of the SOGR audits drive the budget and assist in setting city-wide priorities.
- Delays in completing the state-of-good-repair backlog have a compounding impact. State-of-good-repair projects not completed within a reasonable timeframe often end up costing significantly more in the long run. If work cannot be undertaken on a timely basis, within several years of the audit, estimated costs will likely have increased due to inflation and further deterioration.
- Over the past five years, over \$150 million has been budgeted to address state-of-good-repair concerns. The state-of-good repair backlog for audited structures is estimated currently to be \$232.318 million dollars at the end of 2008. This backlog estimate will likely increase as the remaining 2008 audits are completed by the end of the year.

• The projected state-of-good-repair backlog based on actual figures during the year reported is estimated at:

End of 2008 - \$232.831 million End of five years (2013) - \$330.625 million

End of ten years (2018) - \$365.870 million (projection)

- Parks, Forestry and Recreation's Facility Compliance Assessment audits are performed by professional engineers and focus mainly on major facilities (for example, ice rinks and aquatic centres). These are the most complex and costly facilities to maintain and operate and they have a significant impact on program delivery. Hence, they require more comprehensive state-of-good-repair audits. Many of the smaller structures are either less sophisticated or have less advanced operating systems (for example, park washrooms or tennis buildings). The detail provided from the visual audits and discussions with staff responsible for maintaining these structures is sufficient to deal with any concerns.
- The more intensive Facility Compliance Assessment audits of major facilities such as community centres, pools and arenas, reconfirm the scope and scale of the state-of-good-repair work needed by Parks, Forestry and Recreation and form the basis of state-of-good-repair estimates in the 2008-2012 Recommended Capital Plan. A Facility Compliance Assessment is also included which assesses the facility conditions against a variety of standards, Acts and Codes including the Occupational Health & Safety Act, the Canadian and Ontario Building Code and the Canadian Construction Association's Mould Remediation guideline (2004). Assessments consist of a wide range of information and include, but are certainly not limited to, the structural condition of the building, fire and life safety conditions, energy efficiency characteristics of current and associated systems and environmental issues pertaining to the Workplace Hazardous Materials Information System (WHMIS).
- State-of-good-repair audits completed to date include: indoor pools (35), outdoor pools (63), indoor arenas (53), artificial outdoor arenas (63), community centres (132), service buildings (97), clubhouses (94), public washrooms (55), field houses (73), concession facilities (13), Toronto Island buildings (50), parks buildings (628), parks bridges (298), parks parking lots (365), greenhouses (16), waterplay and splash pads (176), tennis courts and sports pads (265) and trails and pathways (580 km). Seawalls, Harbourfront Centre and ferry boat audits were completed last year.
 - Other assets that remain to be audited include: ferry dock facilities, bocce courts, ball diamonds, cricket pitches, fountains, and boardwalks.
- Included with the 2008 Capital Budget and 2009-2012 Capital Plan were estimates for the next 5 year provided with no reference to a debt affordability target for the period. As debt affordability targets have not been provided for the full 10-Year period, a number of projects are not longer included 10-Year Capital Plan and Forecast. Among the projects which have been deferred are Community Centre Projects for Scarborough City Centre, Sheppard Corridor Don Mills McCowan, Etobicoke Coty Centre, North Rexdale, and Central Waterfront and a number of smaller projects.

Program Capacity and Readiness to Proceed

In the past, spending rates have not supported a capacity to expand the Parks, Forestry and Recreation capital budget. The Program has a history of challenges in spending its annual Approved Capital Budget. As the table below indicates, the average spending rate from 2001 to 2008 is 60%.

The Program has worked to phase the cash flow for large projects over several years, establishing a planning phase in the first year. The inclusion of projects in the budget whose funding is not entirely received by the City is actively discouraged; as such projects cannot proceed until all funding is available. Proceeds from sources such as Section 37 Agreements cannot be reliably timed in advance, thus these projects are not included in the budget until receipt of the funds. A recommendation is included with the 2009 Capital Budget stating that all projects with third party funding are approved conditionally, subject to the receipt of that funding.

There are several factors which contribute to project delay, but are generally outside of staff control. Approximately 60% of the work required with Parks, Forestry and Recreation capital projects is outdoors and subject to delays due to adverse weather conditions. Extended public consultation processes also significantly delay the progress of capital work.

The Program is projecting an improved spending rate for 2008, based on the actions described above, as well as ensuring that project funding added to the Budget during the year is phased, in accordance with a realistic cash flow plan, over several years.

Changes to the 5-Year Capital Plan (2009-2013)

The Recommended 5-year Capital Plan includes a number of changes from the Council Approved 2008-2012 Capital Plan arising from the inclusion of projects that address City priorities and commitments.

• Regent Park and Community Centre

The redevelopment of Regent Park is a City priority, coordinated by the Toronto Community Housing Corporation (TCHC), requiring the City to support the renewal of community infrastructure, including redevelopment of the Main Park and a new Community Centre. Work on the Main Park will start in 2009 with a planning phase, and be completed in 2011, for a total

cost of \$6.250 million. The Community Centre is budgeted for \$10.2 million over the same time period.

• Railway Lands Community Centre

A partnership with TCHC, the Toronto District School Board, the Toronto Catholic District School Board, and Children's Services has resulted in the inclusion of \$13.9 million for a project to construct the community centre portion of a shared facility in the Railway Lands area (Spadina/Front) to be completed in 2011.

• St. Matthew's Lawn Bowling Club House

An Ontario Municipal Board decision on a mixed-use redevelopment of the Bridgepoint Hospital site resulted in the heritage site designation of St. Matthew's Lawn Bowling Club House and the structure coming into City ownership. However, the Club House now must be relocated from its location on Gerrard Street in front of the Don Jail to East Riverdale Park, to facilitate the redevelopment of the site. Its relocation in 2009 is provided for in an Outdoor Recreation Centre project at a cost of \$1.555 million.

Toronto Island Ferry Safety re-fits

Transport Canada has ordered mandatory bulkhead re-fits to the Thomas Rennie and Sam McBride ferries which serve Toronto Island in the summer months. This work will cost a total of \$5 million and will be phased over 2 years, with no disruption to the summer ferry service, beginning in 2009.

Dogs Off Leash Area Fencing

The Dogs, People and Parks Policy approved by Council in 2007 has resulted in the identification 19 off-leash areas, each of which require fencing and a gate. The 2009 Recommended Capital Budget includes \$1.5 million to meet this requirement.

Fleet and Equipment to support expansion of the Tree Canopy

To support the Tree Canopy expansion and the improved maintenance of the urban forest a number of new fleet and equipment purchases are included in the 2009 Recommended Capital Budget and 2010-2012 Capital Plan, totalling \$5.6 million. These are recommended on the condition that the related Operating Budget resources are approved by Council in the 2009 Operating Budget process.

Capital Projects Highlights

The 10-Year Capital Plan advances the following strategic priorities by including funding in the first 5 years:

• Strengthen Our At-Risk Neighbourhoods

The Parks, Forestry and Recreation Recommended 5-Year Capital Plan will continue to invest in recreational infrastructure in Toronto's Priority Neighbourhoods on a partnership basis. Renovations to improve community space at Antibes Community Centre in the Westminster-Branson neighbourhood

(a \$1.7 million project with \$1 million of debt funding) and at Crescent Town (a \$0.300 million project with \$0.200 million of debt funding). In the Jane-Finch neighbourhood, an outdoor portable stage venue with seating will be developed near the Oakdale Community Centre (a \$1.250 million project with \$1 million of debt funding).

• Invest \$13 Million in 13 Priority Neighbourhoods

Parks, Forestry and Recreation's Recommended 5-Year Capital Plan includes the continued investment in the 13 Priority Neighbourhoods such as the Warden Woods Community Centre Construction phase for \$9.549 million in 2009 and 2010, as well as a total of \$10.045 million the next two years to be allocated to other Priority Neighbourhood projects. Included among these projects are an additional youth activity space at the McGregor Community Centre in Dorset Park, and at the East Scarborough Boys and Girls Club, and expansion of the Scarborough Village Community Centre to create a community hub, all of which are based on partnerships with various outside parties.

• Make Progress On The Waterfront

Most of the capital funding for the development of waterfront parks resides with Waterfront Toronto. However, Parks, Forestry and Recreation continues with the multi-year state-of-good-repair program for Harbourfront Centre and associated seawalls and outdoor amenity spaces. The 5-Year Capital Plan includes \$9.2 million in new funding for this initiative.

• Speed Up the Implementation of Toronto's Bike Plan

In the City's 2009 Recommended Capital Budget and 2010-2013 Capital Plan, the Toronto Bike Plan has now been focused in the Transportation Services Capital Budget. Starting in 2009, Transportation Services will be responsible for the majority of items required to deliver the Bike Plan by 2012. Capital funding of \$7.950 million has been transferred from Parks, Forestry and Recreation to Transportation Services for 2009-2013 to deliver the off-road bike trails identified in the Bike Plan. Coordination between the two Programs will support this acceleration strategy. Parks, Forestry and Recreation continues its responsibility for the State-of-Good-Repair work on Trails, Pathways and Bridges in Parks, with \$15.125 million of new project funding being provided in the 2009 Recommended Capital Budget and 2010-2013 Capital Plan, as well as various upgrades and new connections for trails within the Parks system.

• Make Toronto a Clean and Beautiful City

Parks, Forestry and Recreation's Capital program works to help ensure that public spaces, facilities, parks and ravines are maintained to meet service quality standards. Landscaping designs and horticultural treatments in parks will continue their contribution to the Clean and beautiful City. In this area, the Recommended 5-Year Capital Plan includes \$1.275 million in funding for development of the Natural Heritage in Valley Brick Works Park, as well as other planting and restoration projects.

The Parks Forestry and Recreation Recommended 5-Year Capital Plan includes \$113.954 million for the construction of new facilities and \$3.376 million for the implementation of new information technology. An additional \$68.780 million is included in the 2014-2018 Capital Forecast. The Facility projects will all result in additional Operating Budget impacts to deliver new services to the public, resulting in a very significant pressure on future year Operating Budgets. The IT projects include the Program's contribution to the City's 311 Customer Service Strategy with an automated work order system. The Major Facility Build program starting in 2011, is included as part of the Program's plans to review service delivery needs and standards to enable a more focused allocation of future years' capital resources. A similar approach is planned for the Parks and Trails Build Program, starting in 2012.

Three major projects, totalling \$38.800 million, to support the redevelopment of Regent Park, in partnership with the Toronto Community Housing Corporation, are included in the Recommended 5-Year Capital Plan. The replacement of the Lord Dufferin Pool, with overall project cost of \$11.550 million, has funding of \$10.481million in the Recommended 5-Year Capital Plan to bring it to completion. Work will start in 2009 on the Main Park and new Community Centre in Regent Park, for completion in 2011, with project costs of \$6.250 million for the Park and \$21 million for the Community Centre.

The Safety Refit of the Thomas Rennie and Sam McBride Toronto Island ferries is required by 2010 as a result of Transport Canada inspections. Work will be performed over the next two years, with no impact to service, and at total estimated cost of \$5 million over the period. This requirement highlights the fact that the Program has no financial provision for either major repairs or replacements for its Ferry Fleet.

Other Highlights:

- The Parks, Forestry and Recreation 2009 Capital Budget includes a system upgrade security plan for various facilities, developed in conjunction with the City's Corporate Security Policy.
- Outdoor Recreation Centre capital projects in the 5-year Plan include the completion of the Tam Heather Tennis Dome; skateboard parks at Ashbridges Bay and other locations; sports and soccer field improvements at Grandravine, Flemingdon, Panorama, Earlscourt and Leacock Parks, among others; and lighting at 2 other parks.
- Park development 2009 highlights include the redevelopment of Oriole Park, Marie Curtis Park (Canada Arsenal lands, joint project with TRCA and the City of Mississauga), and Phase 2 of the CPS Lead Trail.
- Playgrounds and water play elements will be upgraded in 2009 and renovated at 12 sites, including a new water play at Harryetta Gardens Parks.
- Construction will begin on the Regent Park Pool (Lord Dufferin), the Warden Woods Community Centre and the Edithvale Community Centres.
- Planning phases will start in 2009 for the York Community Centre, The Milliken Park Community Centre, Marie Curtis Parks, and the Oriole Park Redevelopment.
- Multi-year projects to be completed in 2009 include the Flemingdon Park redevelopment, Jenner Jean-Marie Community Centre Expansion, O'Connor Community Centre expansion, the Stephen Leacock Arena renovation and the Ashbridge's Bay Skateboard Park.

The Parks, Forestry and Recreation 2009-2013 Recommended Capital Plan will increase future-year Parks, Forestry and Recreation operating budgets by approximately \$6.526 million net and 152 new positions, over the five-year period. The Program will incur additional operating budget impacts from completion of projects delivered by Waterfront Toronto and the Toronto and Region Conservation Authority (TRCA), as well as in-kind park improvements arising from Section 37 Agreements with developers. The operating budget impacts of these Parks, Forestry and Recreation capital projects will be 100% City-funded, although efforts are being made to secure contributions from Waterfront Toronto to assist in that area over the 5 years following project completion.

These figures represent an estimate of operating budget impacts and positions required, as well as the timing of project completion.

Operating budget impacts arising from the 2014-2018 Proposed Capital Forecast have not been developed, for the most part. This information will be required as part of the preparation of a firm 2010-2019 Capital Plan and Forecast for the 2010 Capital Budget process.

Comments / Issues:

- The Parks, Forestry and Recreation 2009 Recommended Capital Budget is \$106.129 million gross. This includes \$7.291 million in unspent funding for projects approved in 2007 and prior years being carried forward to 2009, \$21.406 million in funding for previously-approved commitments, \$54.102 million for new projects, and \$23.330 million in unspent funding for projects approved in 2008 to be carried forward to 2009.
- The 2009 Recommended Capital Budget will be financed by debt of \$44.867 million; Development Charges of \$7.393 million; reserve funds of \$23.153 million; and other funding, such as donations and partnerships, of \$30.716 million.
- Approval of the 2009 Recommended Capital Budget will result in new commitments of \$33.874 million in 2010 and \$16.620 million in 2011.

2009 Recommended Capital Budget

2009 Recommended Capital Budget versus Debt Target

The 2009 Recommended Capital Budget meets the 2009 debt affordability guideline of \$40.681 million. This target represents a \$5.551 million or 15.8% increase from the \$35.130 million in new debt that was approved for 2008. This increase represents another moderate increase in the Program's debt allocations, to address state of good repair needs, while supporting improved spending rates.

Capital Budget by Project Category

34% of the funding in the Parks, Forestry and Recreation 2009 Recommended Capital Budget is allocated to State-of-Good-Repair projects. Despite this allocation of \$28.247 million to new State-of-Good-Repair projects, the Program's accumulated backlog will grow during the year from \$232.931 million at the end of 2008 to \$260.928 million.

31% of the funding in the Parks, Forestry and Recreation 2009 Recommended Capital Budget is allocated to Growth-Related projects. Of the total allocation of \$25.591 million, \$20.220 million is allocated to new community centre projects and \$3.781 million to the Lord Dufferin Pool project.

29%, or \$24.416 million, of the funding in the Parks, Forestry and Recreation 2009 Recommended Capital Budget is allocated to Service Improvement projects. Service Improvement projects are primarily focused on Park development project with other funding distributed among Outdoor Recreation Centres, Playgrounds and Waterplay projects, Trails and Pathways and small Community Centre improvements.

6% of the funding in the Parks, Forestry and Recreation 2009 Recommended Capital Budget is allocated to Legislated projects. Two primary projects make up most of this category -- \$1.555 million for the required relocation of the St. Matthews Lawn Bowling Club House from the Bridgepoint Hospital site and \$2.5 million for the first phase of the Ferry Re-fit project.

Capacity and Readiness to Proceed

The Program has worked to improve its spending rates over the past several years. Projects have been phased over several years to reduce the impact of any delays in the planning and community consultation phases, on overall spending rates. Large and mid-size projects are cash flowed over several years, based on realistic expectations. For the most part, projects with incomplete third party funding are not included in the Budget until funds are available. State-of-Good-Repair work in Capital Asset Management Plan (CAMP) projects are directed by a priority list developed from building and facility audits, which allows work to move forward at other locations is issues arise.

PART III: ISSUES FOR DISCUSSION

2009 Recommended Capital Budget Issues

• St. Matthew's Lawn Bowling Club House Move

As a result of the Ontario Municipal Board's approval of a mixed-use redevelopment of the Bridgepoint Hospital site and the heritage site designation of the St Matthew's lawn bowling club house, located on that site, the City became responsible for the relocation of the club house from its location in front of the Don Jail to East Riverdale Park. This responsibility was assigned to Parks Forestry and Recreation, with the relocation having a total cost of \$1.555 million, of which Bridgepoint Hospital will provide \$0.450 million. This project funding is included as an Outdoor Recreation Centre project in the 2009 Capital Budget.

Projects Dedicated to Planting of Trees and Shrubs

It has been determined that the City will follow the Public Sector Accounting Board standard that excludes natural assets, such as trees and shrubs, from being treated as capital assets. As a result, tree and shrub acquisition projects in the capital budgets of all City Programs have been transferred to the respective operating budgets, and reserve fund resources have been allocated to provide for them in 2009. The Parks Forestry and Recreation Capital Budget in recent years has included a Tree Advocacy project providing \$1.5 million for tree planting, with \$1 million of debt funding supplemented by \$0.5 million of donations. In addition, \$0.105 million of funding was included in the Environmental Initiatives project for trees and shrubs to naturalize parkland areas. These amounts will now be transferred to the Parks Forestry and Recreation Operating Budget and previous debt funding will now be funded from a designated reserve fund. Tree planting funds in other Capital Budgets will be treated in a similar manner. This will provide room for other projects, particularly SOGR.

Emergency Fund

The Parks, Forestry and Recreation 2009 Recommended Capital Budget includes \$0.500 million for a Capital Emergency Fund sub-project.

It is recommended that the approval of the 2009 Capital Emergency Project funding be subject to the conditions listed below, which are the same as in 2008, with a report on the use of the 2009 funding to be submitted to Budget Committee at the time of consideration of the 2010 Capital Budget.

- a) projects funded must be demonstrable emergencies presenting a safety or security hazard, or impacting current operations, with a potential for significant damage resulting from the continuation of the problem identified;
- b) all projects charged to the 2009 Capital Emergency Fund sub-project must be reported to Finance staff to ensure structures are provided to ensure accountability;
- c) use of the funding must be reported in all variance reports and to Budget Committee at the time of consideration of the 2010 Capital Budget; and

d) any unspent balance at year-end cannot be carried forward.

• Fleet Requirements to Support Maintenance of the Urban Forest

A total of \$5.797 million is included in the Capital Plan for 2009-2012 to acquire fleet and equipment necessary to increase tree preservation and the maintenance of the urban forest. These are related to New and Enhanced Service requests that will be considered with the Parks, Forestry and Recreation 2009 and future year Operating Budget. A total of \$1.039 million is recommended in the 2009 Capital Budget, conditional upon approval of the Operating Budget costs. The following lists the fleet and equipment expenditures included in the 2009 Recommended Budget and 2010 -2012 Capital Plan, subject to operating funding and future operating submissions. The timing of these items will be reviewed in light of decisions to move forward in the 2009 and future year Parks, Forestry and Recreation Operating Budgets

5-Year Capital Plan Issues

• Development Charge Financing

Although Development Charge funding in the 2009 Recommended Capital Budget is allocated based on confirmed balances in the Development Charge Reserve Fund, future year Development Charge funding is allocated on the basis of estimated future Development Charge revenues being received by the City, based on the new Development Charge By-law before Council this Fall. As a result, all Development Charge funded projects will be re-evaluated during the 2010 Capital Budget process, to ensure consistency with the new Development Charge By-Law and forecast of development charge revenue.

Strategy for Parkland Acquisition

The Recommended 5-Year Capital Plan includes only one ongoing project for Parkland Acquisition, with an estimated spending \$0.200 million per year for land acquisition costs. The practice has been to amend the Program's Capital Budget with in-year, individual reports for Committee and Council each time an acquisition opportunity comes forward. This approach does not follow capital budget policy and does not secure land acquisition funding for sites critical to program delivery priorities.

The Program intends to develop a service plan which will identify areas where parkland and facilities are below standard. To comply with capital budget policy, it is recommended that the costs of future land acquisitions be included in future parkland and facility development projects according to establish service plan priorities. Where specific facility projects require land for delivery, this cost should be included in the specific project for which land acquisition is required, as part of the cost of a new community centre, park or other facility. This will effectively support dedication of reserve fund land acquisition resources to support delivery of the Program's service plans.

• Adequacy of funding for Toronto Island Ferry Renewal and Replacement

The requirement for \$5 million of debt funding in the 2009-2013 Recommended Capital Plan for ferry refits raises a concern about the lack of financial provisions for future major repairs or replacement of the Toronto Island Ferry Fleet. Although these vessels are required for a service for which user fees are charged, the City does not set aside any portion of that fee for fleet replacement and renewal. It is recommended that the Program report during the 2010 Operating Budget process on a strategy to develop a financial capacity to renew and replace the ferry fleet.

5-Year Capital Forecast Issues

• Major Facility Build Project and Parks and Trails Build Program

The 10-Year Capital Forecast includes 2 projects which set aside funds for future facility and parkland developments. These are really "place holder" projects within the 10 year Plan and Forecast. The Program intends to review service delivery needs and standards to enable a more focused allocation of future years' capital resources in major capital-intensive facility areas such as pools, arenas and community centers, as well as trails and parkland. It is expected that this will result in future years' Capital Plans benefiting from clear program direction and supporting future service delivery in areas of need.

• 5-Year Capital Forecast Development

In prior year Capital Budgets, the City had no capital targets past the 5th year of the Capital Plan. In the 2009 Capital Budget process, it was decided to bring forward 10 years of debt targets. For the Parks, Forestry and Recreation Capital Forecast (2nd 5-years) this has resulted in a dramatic reduction of forecasted expenditures in order to meet the debt targets set for the outer 5 years. Rather than a 2nd 5 year period showing almost double the values of the 5-Year Capital Plan, the 2nd 5 year forecast is virtually equal in value to the 5-Year Plan years.

Prior to 2009, many projects were pushed from the 5-Year Plan into the 2nd 5 years into what became a list of requests significantly above future affordability targets. This year, with the development of 10 years of debt targets, many such projects have fallen past the end 10 year planning span. Of course, there are also greater uncertainties concerning availability of reserve funds, development charges, and other funding sources, in the 5-Year Forecast period, as well. However, there is now a much more realistic representation of projects which can be delivered within the 10 year span, than was previously seen.
