 Toronto families are losing ground and falling far behind the Toronto CMA, the province, and the country


Median income of families (with children 0–17) in Toronto, the Toronto CMA, Ontario and Canada

Median income of lone-parent families (with children 0-17) by selected geographic areas, 1990, 2000, 2005





Percentage of low-income families (of total family population with children 0-17)



Percentage of low-income, lone-parent families (of all lone-parent families with children 0-17)


